A community-led effort is changing how Chesterton streets handle heavy rains, using natural solutions that are good for both the environment and our neighbourhoods.

Local group, Water Sensitive Cambridge, has established two projects which use low-cost, 'smart approaches' to make our area tougher and greener. The first project involved turning grass verges into "kerb-cut rain gardens" in Fallowfield, East Chesterton. Funded by the River Cam CAN grant, these clever gardens send stormwater from the road into planted flower beds, letting the water soak naturally into the ground. This not only eases the strain on the drainage system but also helps keep polluted water spilling out to the River Cam. They also provide crucial homes for local wildlife, sustaining them through the drought we had this year.

Building on their pilot's success, Water Sensitive Cambridge have launched a second phase at the nearby Fallowfield apartments. Teaming up with Hundred Houses Society and funded by Cambridge Water, this project involved putting in "SlowFlow™

Planters." These cool planters reroute roof downpipes away from drains, working like rain gardens by holding a lot of water during a storm and slowly letting it out into nearby flower beds. The SlowFlow[™] Planters are made locally in partnership with the Phoenix Trust in Milton, using upcycled pallet wood, and offer a handy way to green up paved areas, further cutting down flood risk and sprucing up the local environment.

Together, these two projects show how Water Sensitive Cambridge is tackling water management in Chesterton with small local interventions. By delivering clear environmental benefits and really involving residents and organizations, they're helping to build a more climate-ready Cambridge for everyone. There are informative signs on both sites.

ST ANDREW'S HALL TO CELEBRATE 20 YEARS SERVING CHESTERTON COMMUNITY

Joint church and community facility is two decades old this November.




November 2025 marks the 20th anniversary of the opening of St Andrew's Hall—the much-valued community facility in St Andrew's Road. The Hall stands on the site of the former Pye electronics works. November events will celebrate the Hall's legacy and future.

Many Chesterton residents will remember when Pye's site was redeveloped. Back then, Michael Bond of Chesterton Community Association was determined that the new housing in Old Chesterton should include a multifunctional community hall. A grant from the developers, lottery funding, and investment by St Andrew's Church together created a facility designed to serve the whole community in as many different ways as possible. Among the many activities now based at the Hall, a Monday Coffee Morning begun in January 2006 is still going strong.

To mark the 10th anniversary in 2015, an extension and Annexe were added. This development increased the variety of the spaces offered at St Andrew's Hall, helping it maintain its rating as one of the best meeting places in the City. Today the Hall hosts a wide range of groups including children's karate classes, Yoga, Philosophy Groups, Drama classes and much more.

To celebrate the anniversary there will a weekend of events including the Annual St Andrew's Advent Fayre, Saturday 29 November, 1 – 4pm. This will be followed by an evening celebration (look out for details nearer the time). This will also launch the Hall's next fundraising campaign for plans to decarbonize its energy use, install solar panels and improve its facilities ready to take St Andrew's Hall forward into the next 20 years.

WILL YOU BECOME A FRIEND OF ST ANDREW'S CHURCH BUILDING?

St Andrew's Church stands in the centre of Chesterton today – and has done so for almost 700 years — thanks to generations of care for this precious building.

The beautiful building that so many of us walk, cycle or scooter past in our daily lives would have looked much the same as far back as the mid-1300s, when the present nave and spire were completed. Then, Chesterton was a few houses, several farms and many fields. Much has changed over the centuries since. In living memory, St Andrew's was surrounded by Pye's factory (see p.2 image from 1980s). Nowadays, many of us live within sight of the spire; and many more enjoy a view of the church and churchyard en route to work or the city centre. Hundreds of us visit the church regularly, to pray, to attend services, to enjoy the peace, to remember.

The Friends of St Andrew's was set up in 1974 with the aim of providing financial support towards preserving and improving the fabric of our beautiful church. Since then, the Friends organization has raised many thousands of pounds to conserve and restore the church, ensuring this heritage can be enjoyed by present and future Chesterton generations. Most recently, the Friends have funded preservation of the spectacular medieval 'Doom' painting, and ensured crucial drainage and damp work has taken place in the South Aisle. St Andrew's continues to be home to a vibrant worshipping community of Anglican Christians who seek to share God's love with all in Chesterton. Many others in our community feel a sense of connection to the building and enjoy it regularly or occasionally. MINISTER'S LETTER

It was great for many of us to be together at the Chesterton Festival recently – enjoying the stalls, food, and wonderful performances, albeit in very hot weather! Well done to everyone who helped organise it and to the many volunteers who gave their time to make it such a success. May it continue to go from strength to strength as we build stronger community links across Chesterton – East and West.

These special times of connecting are vital, especially as many today sense a growing fragmentation in society. Isolation and loneliness are rising, and mental health challenges – especially among young people are becoming overwhelming. The question is: why is this happening? Part of the answer may lie in the loss of a shared story that binds us together. The growth of choice, travel, achievement, and consumption was meant to make us happier – but many now feel adrift, some even calling it a "crisis of meaning." A generation is growing up questioning the world it's inheriting. Former Prime Minister Tony Blair once observed: "We enjoy a thousand material advantages over any previous generation, but we experience a depth of insecurity and spiritual doubt they never knew."

I wonder if you caught the news about The Quiet Revival – a new national study by the Bible Society and YouGov showing that churchgoing in England and Wales has doubled in the last six years. Two million more people now attend church than in 2018. Even more surprising: the growth isn't among the elderly, but the young. In 2018, only 4% of 18–24-year-olds said they attended church monthly. Today it's 16%. Among young men, it jumped to 21%. Many are wondering why and how to explain it.

Maybe a restless generation is searching for something more solid than shopping and scrolling – something like meaning, hope, challenge, and connection. The report's co-author said: "Churchgoers are more likely to report higher life satisfaction, stronger community connection, and lower levels of anxiety or depression – especially young people." Change is afoot in our culture. Not long ago, atheism felt like the norm and faith was a bit, well, embarrassing. But that's no longer the case. From podcasts to sport and social media, many public figures now speak confidently about their Christian faith. It seems reports of God's death were greatly exaggerated.



It was G.K. Chesterton who once said: "There are two ways of getting home... one is to stay there. The other is to walk around the whole world until we come back to the same place." Our culture is restless and unsure - and people are looking for belonging and connection. Perhaps one way forward could be that it's time to start to rediscover the faith we once called home?
