What does the name Wintercomfort mean to you? For more than 30 years, the charity has been at the forefront of support for homeless people in Cambridge. The origins of the name speak to its earliest activities – provision of hot food and warm clothing for rough sleepers during the harsh winter months. Today of course, Wintercomfort supports homeless people and those at risk of homelessness every day of the year, providing drop in access at their centre on Victoria Avenue alongside a huge range of support services to help people rebuild their lives and move towards a positive future.

Adapting to the challenges of the world today, the charity has recently taken steps to raise awareness of and increase access to their support services by providing pop-up advice clinics in community spaces around Cambridge.

As Fundraising and Communications Manager Melody Brooker explained "It's an inescapable truth that the rising cost of living is causing many people in our community serious problems that could, in the worst cases, lead to homelessness. We want to let people know that we are here to help. We can support anyone who is in need of advice and support with any issues that might be putting their housing situation at risk. We want people to talk to us long before they reach the point of facing homelessness."

Cambridge Nursery Federation
Brunswick | Colleges | Fields

In September 2021 Cambridge Nursery Federation (Brunswick and Colleges Nursery Schools) were joined by The Fields Nursery School. The federation has one governing body and an Executive Headteacher.

All three state maintained nursery schools offer places for 2,3 and 4 year olds. We take children from across Cambridge and the surrounding area, and provide flexible sessions from 8.00am till 5.15pm. We are led by qualified teachers and have a staff body with specialist Early Years skills. The children attending come from all over the world and speak many different languages. We welcome children with SEND and have specialist Teaching Assistants to work alongside them. We offer speech therapy and music therapy from trained professionals.

We offer forest school trips and have an annual visit from Ark Farm. It was interesting to see farm animals instead of children lining up to come in in the morning! The children love to meet the animals close up.

News from the Churches

St Andrew's Church

Ordinary Time is the season in which we celebrate the life and teachings of Jesus Christ and what it means to be his disciples. The name of this season is derived from the Latin word *ordināre*, to order or number things properly. The church's Ordinary Time is divided into two parts. The first falls between Christmas and Lent.

The second – where we are now – occurs between the seasons of Easter and Advent. Green, seen everywhere in plants and trees, symbolizes life and hope and is the colour used during Ordinary Time. The Sundays are numbered Trinity 1 (19 June) to Trinity 19 (23 October). This time without major festivals was valuable in years gone by when much parish life was dominated by the demands of the farming year.

In St Andrew's we are counting the weeks until we can find out and meet the person who has been chosen to be our new vicar. It is very frustrating that we still cannot learn who he/she is until a number of significant things have been worked through: the date when the extensive work at the vicarage is finished; the date for the period of notice for the congregation at the current church of the new vicar. Churchwarden Maggie is in contact with those in a position to move matters along: the Archdeacon, the diocesan property department, Trinity College, and we are sending

messages of warm encouragement to the new vicar. It's like being on a hospital waiting list for an operation with no date yet specified!

The life of the church has meantime been making good on opportunities for life and hope. Various of our young people have been involved in key milestones of discipleship, including baptism, confirmation and first communion, and a large group went with youth leaders to a residential weekend in Suffolk, deepening their Christian fellowship. Vassa Sunday (24 July) was celebrated with a floral wreath and recitation, and was attended by a group from a north London church. Bishop Dagmar Winter of Huntingdon came and led a service on 10 July.

We have been fortunate to have the faithful assistance of a number of local clergy since Nick's departure. However summer holidays are important for rest and recuperation. Consequently **the 10am service on Sunday 14 August, will be Morning Prayer led by members of the congregation. This will be followed by a Picnic Brunch on the lawn by the church. All Welcome.**

Minister's Letter

Have you heard of the Greater Cambridge Partnership's proposals for *A New Road Classification for Cambridge*? They are hoping to try to channel cars away from local roads and streets, and on to the main roads, as much as possible. It has made me think again about the way our choices so often have knock-on effects on others, which we simply don't stop to think about.

Freedom of choice is, perhaps, the defining characteristic of Western civilisation, and one of the main reasons why we value such choice is because we equate it with freedom. There is some truth in that, of course, but very often the choices we can actually make are relatively trivial. For instance, we can choose between a bewildering variety of types, sizes, and colours of cars, but even in Cambridge many people feel that they have very little choice about whether or not to have a car in the first place.

For too many, a car seems to have become an essential tool of modern life, without which they simply could not do all that they need to do. And yet a significant minority, made up of the oldest, the youngest, and the poorest — in short the most vulnerable — cannot have one. But the 'choice' of the rest of us to own and use a car limits the choices and opportunities of these more vulnerable members of society, by the whole range of ways it

shapes our communities, our neighbourhoods, and the provision of services.

That is just one example of how our 'free' choices, combined with those of many others, end up restricting the freedom of yet others. But the emphasis on choice as an expression of freedom distracts us from these consequences.

Make no mistake: freedom is precious — one of the most precious gifts of God to his human creatures — and it is not merely tragic but evil that so many of them do not enjoy the freedom for which they were created. But the freedom to make consumer choices is only a poor imitation of the real thing.

True freedom is neither selfish nor arbitrary. It finds its most authentic expression in freely choosing to limit my own choices for the sake of others. And the most perfect example of that is found in Jesus, who gave up his life in order to free us from the greed and self-interest which so easily enslave us without us even realising it.

Choosing to follow him is both the most significant and the most worthwhile choice that any of us can make — and it really is open to everyone.
