#### **Junior Church**

As February begins, we are only just coming to the end of the season of Epiphany, so a quick look back to Advent and Christmas seems justifiable especially as there were so many opportunities for creative worship together with our children and young people. Think back to the twilight service where the Minims sang and where children and adults alike made their own Christingles, pinning a red ribbon around the orange earth and planting the Light of Christ firmly in the centre. Or remember the glorious nativity tableau with young and old, laughter and solemnity, each playing their part. More recently, our young 'royals' dressed up and processed up the nave with great dignity to lay their gifts at the feet of the Christ Child...

### 10AM SERVICES AND GROUPS FOR FAMILIES, YOUTH AND CHILDREN

#### **ALL-AGE SERVICE**

### **Azul Wasi News**

The children at Azul Wasi have started their new school year after the long Christmas holiday. Several of them have now left school and gone on to do further training for their future careers. The boys were all delighted to win a sports championship against other children's homes recently, which has done a lot to boost their self-esteem.

However, there have been a number of problems for Alcides to face. The unstable political and economic situation in Peru means that prices vary greatly day by day, which makes budgeting difficult; it is also a challenge to keep abreast of new legislation concerning the guardianship of children. New health requirements have meant that the children need health checks before attending school, and there is a problem with the treatment of parasitic conditions, which are rife in rural areas; there is particular concern about the management of one of the children who has anaemia.

Alcides is wary of contracting new staff, following a problem with the former tutor and his wife, who have now left; he is managing things largely by himself, recently assisted by Dante, who grew up at Azul Wasi, and his wife, Vicky; Alcides's son has also been helping when he can. To add to all this, Alcides is suffering his own health problems.

We are now sending our regular donation of £875 towards food costs month by month, having found a way of doing this at negligible cost, so this should help Alcides's cash flow situation without incurring massive bank charges, and we are in much more frequent touch with Alcides, who keeps us up to date with developments.

Please pray for him, his family and the boys as they confront everyday problems which for the most part are quite alien to us.


## St Andrew's Lent Course 2024: Being Disciples

Lent begins on 14 February 2024 - Ash Wednesday.

Over the following 5 weeks, the St Andrew's Lent Course will be based on **Rowan Williams' short book: Being Disciples** (SPCK 2016). This is a readable and thoughtful book drawn from accessible talks that the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, gave to groups exploring what it means for us to be disciples of Christ in the contemporary world. Philip hopes the book will help us as a church grapple with and gain confidence around questions of how we live a thinking, praying and generous faith everyday, beyond our Sunday gatherings.

In February, there will be sign up sheets at the back of church for people to indicate in person which group they intend to join. We currently have venues for groups meeting on Tuesday morning, and Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings. I have just finished reading "Cuddy" by Benjamin Myers. Published only last year.


Cuddy is the nickname given to St Cuthbert, mainly in the North, (so probably pronounced accordingly). He features prominently in the story, but only after his death, in the way his life affected others. The first section covers the bringing of his coffin from the Farne islands to Durham, a journey that actually took several years.

Then it moves forward to the building of Durham Cathedral, and the final sections bring bring us up to date via the Victorian era.

The story is very intricately constructed, Mr Myers is highly skilled, and includes poetry, prose, page layout and varying type sizes, as well as a real feeling of time and place.

The Central Library has a copy for which there is already a waiting list, and the hardback is half price in Blackwells /Waterstones, i.e. £10 reduced from £20, and excellent value in my opinion. (One member of our ministry team has already asked to borrow it!)

### Thought for the Month

I was recently trawling through BBC iPlayer to find something to watch one evening and stumbled across a documentary: the Cambridgeshire Crucifixion. This was about an extraordinary archaeological discovery made only a few years ago, barely 12 miles from here, near Fenstanton. The find - which was unearthed by accident during digging for a housing development was the grave of a man who had been crucified around 250AD.

Before watching this programme, I had not appreciated just how rare was the actual archaeological evidence for crucifixion. Historians tend not to call into question that this horrible method of execution was practised by the Romans and practised on thousands all across the Empire. Written and illustrative evidence survives in sculpture and reliefs from the era, not just the Gospels. But before this Fenland dig, there were literally only one or two other confirmed instances of the physical remains of someone crucified being unearthed anywhere, ever.

The key reason for this striking historical absence is thought to be because most victims of Roman crucifixion were slaves. They were people considered not to count - and had no worth in society. And so, they did not receive a proper burial. Their bodies were simply dumped and forgotten.

This Fenstanton slave was unusual for being cared for enough by those who knew him to receive his own burial. This man counted for someone. His worth was seen.

Reflecting on this history, I have found myself reading certain passages from the New Testament in fresh ways. I am moved by the resonances with the story of the women caring for Jesus' body and of Joseph of Arimathea providing his grave. Jesus counted, his worth was seen by his friends, even as the authorities of his day assumed he should be dumped and forgotten.

And then there are the words of Paul to the Philippians, describing how, 'though he was in the form of God', Christ 'did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form. he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death — even death on a cross' (Philippians 2.5-8).

Perhaps it took this archaeology programme to help me see the link between 'form of a slave' and 'death on a cross' which Paul's first-century readers would have taken for granted.

But as we remember Jesus' death on a cross this coming Lent and Easter, we recall where Jesus' story goes next. As Paul writes: 'Therefore God also highly exalted him' - meaning God raised him. Raised him in resurrection. Raised him in the Ascension, Raised him to be above all, and so show God's answer to the sin and death embodied in the cross

Now that's quite something to think about after an evening watching IPlayer.
