


NEWS AND MESSAGES: YOUTH GROUP NEWS



A Visit to York Minster

I was in York during the second week of July this year. Though I didn't realise it at the time, on the 9th of the month it was the 40th anniversary of the dramatic events which began when, in 1984, a bolt of lightning struck the roof of the Minster in the small hours, resulting in a fire which caused untold damage, and gave rise to amazing acts of heroism by the Minster staff and by local people who rushed inside with wet cloths over their noses to try to bring out as many valuable artefacts as they could. The fire service and police also worked selflessly for many hours. Approximately 4 years later all was beautifully restored.

As I approached the Minster, I saw a fire engine and police vehicles parked by the walls. I was told there was a special Commemoration Evensong in progress, so no public entry was permitted, but after a whispered conversation with one of the attendants, I was allowed to creep in and take a seat, which was a great and unexpected privilege. From almost the back row, I could hear the choir's beautiful rendition of Herbert Sumsion's 'Magnificat' and 'Nunc Dimittis,' and also, (of course) when the organ absolutely thundered out Parry's 'I Was Glad'.

Both the Bible readings referred to fire. From the Old Testament, Moses and the Burning Bush, and from the New, part of the first Epistle of Peter "your faith ... is tested by fire...". Unfortunately, I couldn't stay to hear the sermon by the Archbishop of York, but it is sure to be available online, and I shall look and hopefully listen too.

You'll be glad to know that when I thanked those who had escorted me in, I passed on greetings from St Andrew's and from the Diocese of Ely, which they much appreciated.



Thought for the Month

I was walking through our Churchyard one early evening recently, and a curious trick of the light drew my eye to a small granite gravestone I had not noticed before. I stepped off the path to check the name on the stone: it read Günther Zuntz (1902-1992). Taking in the dates of this life, I wondered about its story; how someone with a German Jewish name came to rest in Chesterton. Within the time it took me to walk home, scrolling on my phone, I had an answer.

Günther Zuntz was born in Berlin into a comfortable family of doctors and scientists, whose family tree can be traced to Jewish settlers in Frankfurt in 1488. Günther's grandfather - a pioneering nineteenthcentury scientist - had converted from Judaism to Protestant Christianity. Zuntz trained to be an academic himself, specialising in ancient languages, and studied at several universities across Weimar Germany, receiving his doctorate in 1927. Zuntz taught Greek and Latin and wrote commentaries on classical texts. He married and started a family.

However, aged 31, Zuntz was removed from his job and lost all his income and security. It was 1933, and the new Nazi government passed a law dismissing anyone Jewish - or whose parent or grandparent was Jewish - from working in the public sector. Zuntz was classified as a "non-Aryan Christian".

Zuntz migrated first to Denmark, where he shifted the focus of his research to Greek texts of the early Christian church. Invitations to speak at academic seminars in England enabled Zuntz to build up contacts in this country, and he moved here in 1939.

Within months the second world war began, and, like many refugees from the Nazi regime, Zuntz was placed in an internment camp on the Isle of Man. He was sent books by British academic friends. Eventually, Zuntz was released and found his way to Oxford, where he ultimately secured an opportunity to lecture on the New Testament.

After the war, Zuntz became a Professor at Manchester University, and would write a seminal book on some of the manuscript texts behind the Bible, as well as teach generations of theologians New Testament Greek. After retiring, he relocated to Cambridge in 1983 with his second wife, Stella, who was English. Their ashes are buried together in an area close to the foot of St Andrew's spire.

Reflecting on this life story, I ponder the echoes in lives being lived now: the insecurity faced by those forced to flee their homelands from prejudice and racism; the contrasting treatment of refugees to our country - either interned as a threat or befriended and encouraged in the gifts they might offer our society. I am reminded of fascism's victims and survivors. And I recognise a life unafraid of studying Christianity's historic origins - finding there the roots of its unity in diversity. I further recall that telling line from George Eliot's Middlemarch: "...for the growing good of the world is partly dependent on unhistoric acts; and that things are not so ill with you and me as they might have been, is half owing to the number who lived faithfully a hidden life, and rest in unvisited tombs."
