Happy New Year! Junior Church's theme for the forthcoming term is 'Events in Jesus's Ministry'. We hope to introduce some stories to the children that they haven't previously encountered in Junior Church.

Wonderers began with Jesus's baptism and the three temptations in the desert. At first, the children thought that saying 'no' was easy (and vigorously practised), but the theme was developed to illustrate that it is much harder when you know you should say 'no' to something that looks attractive. The creative responses included these art works, and the 'desert' sand was popular for play as always. The story quickly evolved beyond the gospel, but it was lovely to see a mixed-age group playing together and creating their own narrative. Even a tidying up narrative was developed which made sure the children mucked in, and it was done in double-quick time.

Future sessions will cover The Calling of the Disciples, Healing the Lame Man, Feeding the 5000, Jesus and the Children, and The Good Shepherd, which will lead us into Easter.

# NEWS AND MESSAGES: YOUTH GROUP NEWS



# News from the Church Library - by Rosemary Mathew

Some time ago it was suggested that an examination of the St Andrew's Library was long overdue. I am glad to report that this has now been done, and you can check it out at the back of the church. The collection is on subjects mainly concerned with Christianity and religious interest. During the sorting out, several unsuitable or damaged items were removed, duplicate copies also, and an attempt was made to list the rest. Most of the work was done by Deborah, who listed everything on her laptop and produced a printed list, now to be found in a plastic folder. Julia also provided help and encouragement, and we are grateful to them both, for without them we'd never have got finished.

The list, of somewhere just short of **200 items**, is in alphabetical order of authors, editors, or keywords, and they are shelved similarly, though not quite as accurately. It should still be fairly easy to find a title. On the top shelf are Bibles and hymn books, and a pile of pamphlets etc which mostly contain Lent Course material, anthologies of seasonal prayers, calendars etc. These are in a horizontal pile as they are unbound and some are quite flimsy. The 2 lower shelves hold most of the books.



You are most welcome to borrow anything. Titles should be entered in the blue ring binder, along with the your name and the date of borrowing. There is no limit to your loan, and you will not be fined however long you keep them! When you return anything, just sign it off with the date of return.


You might see on the shelf (right at the beginning and so not remotely in alphabetical order) a National Geographic special reissue "Kings of the Bible" which I bought just before Christmas for the princely price of £9.99 (pictured above). I should perhaps have foreseen that the gorgeous image – 'Three Wise Men' by J.C. Leyendecker, 1900 - was misleading as the Magi are not mentioned at all in the following text. This is in fact accurate since they were not ever in the Gospel referred to as kings, but I had been hoping for a gathering together of the limited amount we think we know about them.

However, the rest of the magazine does its best to inform the reader about those kings who are mentioned in Genesis and Exodus (chapter 1), the time of Ancient Israel (chapter 2), and the Time of Judea (chapter 3). The text as a whole is generally fairly informative, perhaps particularly to non-churchgoers, and is naturally extremely well illustrated as we have come to expect from the National Geographic, with reproductions of well-known works of art and photographs and maps.

I am undecided as to whether it was wise or foolish to buy the magazine. If I were feeling uncharitable I might accuse the publishers of cashing in on the Christmas season. As I don't need to keep it, I have donated it to the library, so you may admire the illustrations for yourselves.

### Thought for the Month

I recently saw the film Conclave, an adaptation of the Robert Harris novel about the fictional election of a new pope. The film has excellent reviews because it is beautifully directed, and all the leading actors give compelling performances. Yet Conclave has also gained a reputation for saying more about politics and the pursuit of power than it does about Christianity.

Quelle surprise! some might say, given it's essentially a story about all the Cardinals in the Roman Catholic Church being locked in a room until two-thirds of them have chosen one of themselves to be pope. This process breeds intrigue, ambition, plotting, and deception, to the detriment of Christian virtues like humility and honesty.

Nevertheless, as I watched the film, I was moved by moments when I glimpsed truths about faith that were subtly illustrated. Perhaps these had a greater impact because they were few, thus witnessing to the struggle to detect, grasp, and sustain faith in our contemporary world.

At the centre of the film is Lawrence, the Dean of Cardinals (played by Ralph Fiennes), whom we learn is struggling to pray. He longs to leave the Vatican and join a monastic order where he can prioritise recovering his relationship with God through prayer.

But Lawrence hasn't been allowed to leave, and the closed doors, shuttered windows, and marble opulence of the Vatican rooms he inhabits through much of the film represent the constraint he feels without prayer. The sequestering of the Cardinals cut off from the outside world until they make a decision - symbolises Lawrence's own sense of being closed in and blocked - by both the processes of the institutional Church and the material certainties and preoccupations of the modern world.

The contrasting glimpses of faith come in moments of the unexpected. Lawrence preaches from an anodyne sermon script but then removes his glasses and speaks instead what's in his heart. A mysterious new cardinal says grace before a meal and departs from convention by praying for those everyone else has forgotten. Finally, the central symbolic moment of the film is represented by an open window and a gentle breeze-as though a wind from God enters the locked room and breathes life and freedom into the proceedings.

I came away from Conclave thoroughly entertained and also moved by its message concerning prayer and faith. This is that the most dangerous opponent of prayer and faith is not doubt but assumed certainty. And it is in noticing the open window and the gentle breeze from God in our lives that Christian faith will be renewed.
